From the President: Kenneth Bob



Every time I go to Israel on an Ameinu "business trip" as I did recently, I am reminded anew of the breadth of our broad organizational agenda.

Let me share a few examples with you.

While attending the Jewish Agency Board of Governors meeting, the latest chapter in ongoing discussion about the importance of the Zionist youth movements and the related budgets allocated for shlichim (Israeli emissaries) took place. It is critical that those of us who appreciate the role that movement graduates play in both Israel and the Diaspora speak out since, unfortunately, there are those involved in these decisions who simply don't "get it." We speak often about the importance of our youth and student work, exemplified by the Habonim Dror youth movement and the Union of Progressive Zionists campus group. While our direct support is crucial, our involvement in decision making venues like the Jewish Agency is important as well.

Although Ameinu is not directly affiliated with the Israeli Labor Party, we do maintain close contact with party leaders. On this trip, I had the opportunity of meeting with Minister Yitzhak Herzog, Knesset member Ophir Pines-Paz and former MK Colette Avital. Much has been written about the deep conflicts in the party over the decision, championed by Defense Minister Ehud Barak, to lead Labor into Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's coalition. I heard from all that the tensions remain, hampering the rebuilding of the Labor Party as a legitimate social democratic electoral alternative.

BINA



BINA was established in the wake of Yitzhak Rabin's assassination in 1995 to address the deep need within Israeli society for a common Jewish narrative and value system. They have sought to create a new leadership in Israeli society comprised of pluralistic, secular scholars versed in traditional Jewish learning from a humanist perspective. BINA helps secular Israelis learn about their Jewish heritage as they develop their personal identities and define their own roles as citizens of Israeli society.

In communities and neighborhoods of diverse socioeconomic backgrounds, they have built a presence, in order to teach and engage adults young and old Continued "BINA," page 3

YEDID

Hebrew for "Friend," Yedid was established in 1997 to enable disadvantaged people to access social entitlements, ensuring the enforcement of social rights and promoting social policy change. They work through a national network of 24 Citizen Rights Centers in underprivileged and marginalized communities throughout Israel to assist communities on the geographic and cultural periphery of Israeli society; foster relations among members of diverse sectors of the population; and bring disenfranchised communities closer to the principles and practice of democracy.

Yedid employs a three-part strategy: legal aid, education, and advocacy. This approach allows them to apply "band-aids" to immediate problems as well as addressing the roots of those problems in public policy. They also use a Continued "YEDID," page 3

Book Review:

Transforming America's Israel Lobby: The Limits of its Power and the Potential for Change by Dan Fleshler Reviewed by David Segal

Since the 2007 publication of Mearsheimer and Walt's flawed analysis, *The Israel Lobby and U.S. Foreign Policy*, much ink has been spilled to correct, deride, and even demonize its authors. The conversation—if it can be called something so benign—in the media and the Jewish community in the wake of their book has too often been accusatory and unproductive, as passions flared on both sides.

Finally, Dan Fleshler has given us a well researched, reasoned, common-sense insider's perspective on Jewish communal operations related to Israel lobbying and American foreign policy. And Fleshler's credentials are worthy: he is a board member of Ameinu, Americans for Peace Now, and the Givat Haviva Educational Foundation, as well as a member of B'rit Tzedek v'Shalom, four groups on the American Zionist left. He is also on the Advisory Council of J Street. Additionally, he has worked as a media and public affairs strategist for many clients that need to communicate with the American Jewish community, including Israel Policy Forum, Bar-Ilan University, the Abraham Fund, AMIT Women, B'nai B'rith International and others.

One of Fleshler's most helpful chapters delineates the vast array of American Jewish organizations engaged in some combination of advocacy, grassroots organizing, public relations, and political fundraising around Israel. Mearsheimer, Walt, and many others incorrectly describe a monolithic "Israel lobby" headed by AIPAC and

uniform in its unequivocal support for the government of Israel.

Fleshler demonstrates how misinformed that view is: in fact, there are many organizations occupying every possible point along the spectrum of opinion on Israel and Palestine. With useful charts, personal anecdotes, and institutional reports, Fleshler enlightens his readers on the details of the multifaceted communal reality and lets us in on what

the misguided might consider a big secret: the many organizations and individuals that constitute the Jewish community rarely speak univocally as "the Jewish community"!

In order to debunk the myth of AIPAC's unbridled political muscle, Fleshler takes a closer look at the history of their legislative and lobbying operations. He attributes much of their success to "smoke and mirrors": the perception of power and the perceived threat of backlash lead politicians to act as if AIPAC had more clout than it does.

This is especially true for AIPAC's relation to the Executive Branch—which, importantly, wields more actual control over American foreign policy than does Congress. Fleshler shows that a confident, determined American President could pursue an aggressively pro-peace process, pro-negotiation policy in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. George H.W. Bush partially succeeded in pressuring Israel against settlement expansion by altering Continued "Book Review," page 6

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The Frontiers of Learning lecture in October 2008 featured Rabbi Chaim Seidler-Feller, Hillel Director, UCLA speaking on "Encounters between Isaac & Ishmael: A Jewish Perspective on the Relationship between Judaism and Islam".

On December 10, 2008, Ameinu-LA had their most successful Hemshech event. 250 people gathered to pay tribute to Bea Chankin Weisberg, their Executive Director and lifelong Jewish communal worker and activist; and to Alisa Belinkoff Katz, Habonim graduate and Chief Deputy to Supervisor Zev Yaroslavsky. Ken Bob was there representing our national movement. As a result, we were able to provide over 20 scholarships to Habonim Dror members participating in Israel programs and to enable NISPED to initiate an educational project that promotes environmental awareness among children and teens in a Bedouin Village.

In related news, Ettie and Marty Taft will receive the Hemshech award, and Yudie Fishman, another Habonim alum, will receive the special Ameinu Award, at our next Hemshech event on November 17, 2009.

On October 30, 2008, Ameinu Detroit co-sponsored an Election Forum with Workmen's Circle and Brit Tzedek v'Shalom. They heard Democrat Doug Ross and Republican Bryce Sandler discuss the two presidential candidates stands on Israel and America's Middle East policy. The Detroit Jewish Newscovered the event.

"Update on Israel" On March 21, Yoav Raban, the community shaliach from Federation's Partnership 2000 Region of the Central Galilee, spoke about the recent Israeli election and young people's attitudes toward Israel. The event was hosted by the Goldberg family at their home.

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On Sunday, April 19, 2009, Ameinu Detroit held its annual Hemshech Award Tribute Luncheon. In recognition of their many years of service to the Jewish community and Israel, Allen and Lita Zemmol were honored with the Hemshech Award; and Marilyn Wolfe with the Tzedek Award. The guest speaker for the event was Brenda Rosenberg, an interfaith peace activist. Ron Sussman made the stained glass awards for the tribute luncheon. Steve Klaper played introductory music and led the group in the U.S. and Israel national anthems.

On September 9, 2008, at Ameinu's office in New York, veteran Israeli journalist Danny Rubinstein led a roundtable discussion cosponsored by Ameinu, Americans for Peace Now, and Meretz USA about the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Rubinstein is Israel's longest serving West Bank correspondent, recently retired from Ha'aretz Daily after a long career as a senior commentator on Palestinian affairs. Having covered the West Bank and Gaza since they fell under Israeli occupation in 1967, Rubinstein is one of the most trusted and respected experts worldwide on Israeli-Palestinian relations. He is the author of several books, among them People of Nowhere: The Palestinian Vision of Home, and The Mystery of Arafat, a biography of the Palestinian leader. Rubinstein, a native of Jerusalem, teaches at Hebrew University and Ben Gurion University in the Negev.

On May 17, 2009, at Temple Beth Israel in Skokle, IL, Ameinu-Chicago cosponsored the Rabbi Ernst M. Lorge Memorial Lecture along with the Lorge Family. Together, they hosted Ruth W. Messinger, President of the American Jewish World Service. In a lecture entitled "Jews as Global Citizens: Our Responsibility in the World," Messinger spoke about her lifelong pursuit of justice and her organization's efforts to improve the quality of life for people around the world. AJWS funds over 400 grassroots projects in 37 countries and sends over 450 skilled volunteers and young people to do hands-on service in the developing world each year.

Our Honorees:



David Twersky joined Habonim in the Bronx, NY in 1964. He was at Machaneh Bonim Deled and the 17th Workshop in Israel at Kibbutz Urim. He lived in Israel on Kibbutz Gezer from 1974-1986. Until March, 2009 he was director of international programs at American Jewish Congress. He also worked as a contributing editor at the New York Sun. During his 12 years in Israel, Mr. Twersky was active in the kibbutz movement and the Labor party.



Leonard Fein is a writer and teacher. In 1974, he founded Moment magazine, which he served as editor and publisher for 13 years. In 1985, he founded Mazon: A Jewish Response to Hunger. And in 1996, he founded the National Jewish Coalition for Literacy. His more than 900 articles and essays have appeared in dozens of publications, including The New York Times, The New Republic, Commentary, Commonweal, The Nation, Dissent and the Los Angeles Times. He writes a syndicated column for the Forward. From 1996 to the year 2000, Fein served as Director of the Commission on Social Action of the Reform Jewish movement.



Rabbi Esther Lederman, originally from Ottawa, Canada, was recently appointed as the Assistant Rabbi at Temple Micah, a Reform synagogue in Washington, DC. For the past two years, she served as the Marshall T. Meyer Fellow at Congregation B'nai Jeshurun of Manhattan. She was ordained in May 2008 from Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in New York. Prior to becoming a rabbi, Rabbi Lederman worked at the Israel Policy Forum, a project on Middle East peace education for the URJ, and Habonim Dror North America as the Mazkira.
